Boxted Wildlife Group

he Boxted Wildlife Group held its third Family Activity Day on the 15th October at the Boxted village hall. The Group is delighted to have yet again received funding from the Dedham Vale AONB Sustainable Development Fund, which meant we could have another fun-packed (and free!) event for local residents. We had a variety of engaging activities from fat ball making, bug-hotel painting, greeting card designing and of course, the ever popular activities, willow weaving and owl pellet dissection! Plus many more. The Wildlife Group would like to thank the volunteers who helped make the activity day a success. It was fantastic to see so many faces, we were certainly kept busy from start to finish! We welcome you back for our next Family Activity Day on Sunday 14th January (10 am -1 pm), again at the Boxted Village Hall, where we will have another host of interesting activities to take part in.

In addition to the activity days for children, we are also hosting a series of wildlife focussed talks for everyone, again free! The first was on Friday 10th November, where Dr Chris Gibson presented a fabulously illustrated and fascinating whistle-stop guide to Essex trees, plants and grasses. Discussing along the way the history of the many habitats found in Essex, how they have been shaped by geology and natural history, how they have further been influenced by mankind and now how they are adapting and changing in response to climate and environmental changes. The next talk is on Monday 5th February entitled "30 years of conserving Essex wildlife".

In Mid-November the group held a working party on the village green to prepare it for the winter and perform the first seasonal cut of the wildflower meadow areas. Over the winter and in early spring the group shall be planting additional hedging to replace areas of hedgerow that suffered in the heat of 2022, as well as planting a multitude of new bulbs in the designated bulb areas of the green and surrounding green spaces.

Willage walks will continue throughout the winter, please see advertised dates. Sturdy walking shoes and suitable clothing are advised for the conditions.

THEY LIVED IN LANGHAM

An occasional series by the Langham Heritage Group

2. SIR ROBERT BALFOUR 1844 – 1929 Langham Hall, 1913 -1927

R obert Balfour was born at Pilmuir, Fife, into a farming family of some substance. Educated Madras School, St Andrews, at 18 he joined the Liverpool and London shipping company Balfour, Williamson & Co. In 1869 he was sent with Alexander Guthrie on a month-long journey by way of New York, the isthmus of Panama and the west coast of North America to San Francisco to found an associate business. Balfour, Guthrie & Company was immediately successful,



expanding rapidly and diversifying from shipping to trading in coal, lumber, fertilisers and grain. The firm grew to become the world's largest dealer in grain and its success was influential in attracting large amounts of British and American capital to the United States' West Coast. A road in Brentwood, California, is named after Balfour and a local leisure park bears the firm's name. After twenty-four years Balfour returned to Britain to become a director of Balfour, Williamson,



first in Liverpool and then in London. Taking up politics in the Liberal interest, Balfour won the Partick (Glasgow) seat in the 1906 General Election, holding the seat until his retirement in 1922. He was created baronet in 1911, in recognition, perhaps, of his staunch

support for Herbert Asquith's Liberal government during the constitutional crisis of 1909-11 occasioned by the controversial Finance and Parliament Acts. In 1913 Balfour bought Broomhouse Farm and the principal part (426 acres) of the Langham Hall estate from the creditors of William Nocton and farmed the land until ill health forced him to retire and sell up in 1927.

keen sporting man and doglover, Balfour welcomed the Essex & Suffolk to hunt the estate land and he was a renowned host to the Colchester Garrison Beagles. His benevolence encompassed the village, for he founded the Langham Nursing District Nurse (1) for Langham and nearby villages and was a regular and generous contributor to its funds. He was co-founder of the Langham Cricket Club, providing not only a ground on the Hall's parkland but erecting a small pavilion and furnishing the gear for the club's first season 2.

Balfour had married Josephine Maria née Beazley of Birkenhead in 1881, while still in San Francisco. They had three sons: the first, Robert, died in infancy and the second, Alexander, died in 1923. Their youngest son, Alan, was killed in action in January 1918, aged 24, while serving with the Royal Flying Corps, to which he had been attached from the Royal Artillery; he is buried in Tincourt New British Cemetery, Somme, and his name is on the Langham War Memorial.

Balfour died at his Prince's Gate, Kensington, home two years after leaving Langham Hall. All three of his sons having predeceased him, the baronetcy was extinguished on his death.

Refurbishment of Boxted Community Hub

Boxted Parish Councillor Arabella Brentnall, who, with the parish council clerk, Karen Thompson, has worked tirelessly on this project arranged the official hub opening meeting recently and Arabella gave the following account of the history of the playing field, the clubs and the facilities:

"Boxted Cricket Club has been in existence since 1830, before even Queen Victoria acceded to the throne. Boxted Lodgers was founded in 1918, being named after Boxted Lodge just up the road, where it, and the Cricket Club, played their matches until 1938, when both clubs moved to the recently endowed King George Playing Fields .

Unfortunately, the following year World War Two broke out, and the playing fields were ploughed up to grow vegetables for the war effort.

In the 1970s, there was a wooden pavilion on this site, erected by the Cricket Club, and later extended by both it and the Football Club.

In those days, as recalls John Hamblion the current Vice-Chair of Boxted Cricket Club, there were just 2 dribbling showers and one old outside toilet consisting only of an open trench. The smell was horrendous and it became a haven for spiders.

In 1995 the Playing Fields were enlarged, thanks to the efforts of the then owners of next door Perryman's, and this is the space you see before you today. The fields are owned by Boxted Parish Council and are now held in trust with Fields in Trust to protect them from ever being turned into something like a housing estate.

Colchester City Ladies Football Club, formerly known as Colchester Town Ladies FC, have made Boxted their home since 2008. In 2015 this building before us, the Boxted Community Hub and Sports Pavilion, was in such a dire state that it had to be closed down by Boxted Parish Council on Health and Safety grounds. There was a lot of press coverage on this subject at the time! The building was given an initial refurbishment, and re-opened later that year with facilities for both the clubs and for a community hub.

2017 saw the creation of the section 106 Agreement, resulting from the planned Hill Farm Housing Estate.

Very many thanks go to Councillor Nigel Chapman and the team at the then Colchester Borough Council for ensuring that this agreement was quite narrowly worded, specifically to ensure that the monies were spent on the " improvement and enhancement of the King George Playing Fields with a specific need for improvement to the Sports and Social Club" and " management of the Playing Fields and Community Hub"



Thanks partly to a grant from Essex County Council, the building was reroofed in 2018 and re-plastered in 2020. And a rather hazardous disabled ramp was installed. Also in 2020 the Boxted Parish Council section 106 Committee was formed, of which the author was appointed chairman. Serious discussions took place with all the Sports Clubs being represented on the Committee, and finally a plan took place.

The Football Foundation were first approached for a grant in May 2021. At this time it was their policy to spend 75% of funding on pitch improvement, sports facilities buildings being deemed much less important. However, they agreed to help us on this refurbishment project. Ingleton Wood were appointed in August 2021 by Boxted Parish Council as design and project managers, and the whole thing was progressing well.

And then Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022. Building prices went through the roof, and all original estimates sky-rocketed. We had to ask the Football Foundation to give us more than the £60,000 we had originally asked for. Amazingly they agreed to up our grant to £98,000.

Nick Emery, our guest of honour, is largely responsible for getting us through the grant process, and we were finally awarded this grant in August 2022. After a sad period of mourning for Queen Elizabeth who died in September, building works started in earnest. A wonderful young local firm called Property 360 were appointed, and they did a super job, and the building was finally signed off in February 2023.

On Monday 23rd October we were all so happy to have this building officially opened by Nick Emery, Head of Development and Investment of the Essex County Football Association. He has been with this project for all of its 2/12 year life"

Langham Parish Council Report – Autumn 2023

ast month's Langham Fireworks Event looked to be touch-and-go at some points, with lots of wet and windy autumn weather in the run up, together with the cancellation of some other local events. In the end we did manage to proceed. More than 1400 people turned up and the vast majority seemed to enjoy themselves. Thankfully, only a handful of cars needed a helping push to get them moving from the muddy field afterwards. However, one of the event food trucks required rather more serious assistance in the form of a local tractor to help free it on the Monday morning following the event! A full set of "thank yous" will be published on the LPC website once the event accounts and fundraising profits have been finalised.

Late summer and autumn has seen the return of organised football to the Recreation Ground pitch, with two local adult teams and a youth team now holding regular matches there. Our investigations into the return of organised cricket may however have hit an insurmountable hurdle, following the results of a recent ball-striking survey, which has identified very onerous and expensive high safety fencing requirements. If this is confirmed, it will at least clarify the situation to allow for more detailed planning of the S106funded Multi Use Games Area to commence.

Speaking of S106 funding, LPC is currently working hard to try to alleviate two major present causes of uncertainty. Both of these issues are adversely impacting our ability to ensure best and timely deployment of local developer funded contributions to help improve village facilities for all local residents.

ristly, there is a lack of clarity and documentation around the process used by Colchester City Council to allocate and distribute this funding. We are currently engaged in a series of meetings with them, to explain our concerns and hopefully then improve the situation moving forwards.

Secondly, the timings of Local Plan approved housing developments appear increasingly uncertain. This is partly due to general economic conditions at the moment, but possibly also due to Anglian Water's recent admission of likely further investment delays to their upgrade of the Langham WRC to meet a revised environmental permit from the Environment Agency. We are currently in negotiations to try to schedule a new public meeting with both Anglian Water and Environment Agency representatives present, so that we can interrogate them jointly about this latest setback. Our MP Sir Bernard Jenkin is kindly assisting us with this and he wants to attend the meeting himself once again.

Boxted Parish Council Report - November 2023

The November meeting of the Parish Council concentrated on the budget as this has to be approved in January. Councillors also, as they do every month, considered the various planning applications and decided where it was appropriate to comment.

The formal opening ceremony of our refurbished Hub facilities took place on 23rd of October with Nick Emery, Chair of Essex FA cutting the ribbon on the sports side facilities. Doug in Harpers Caffe put on a great spread. We had Colchester City and Essex County Councillors and officers as well as representatives of Colchester City Ladies Football, Boxted Lodgers and Boxted Cricket Club. Property360 who undertook the refurbishment and Ingleton Wood who acted as project consultants were all present. Arabella Brentnall spoke about the history of volunteers that are interested in the facilities and summarised the refurbishment project. A good time was had by all those attending.

The small committee styled room is available for public hire when the clubs are not using it which is most daytimes. There is scope for it to be used as a remote office facility for anyone with poor Wi-Fi at home. With a kitchenette for teas and coffees; the café next door and <u>free</u> Wi-Fi – it's also a good meeting room seating about 10 people. It has lovely full-length windows looking on to the field and we hope it will be well utilised. If you are interested in hiring the space then

The council has to review and amend the current Boxted Neighbourhood Plan – this is a really important document as it forms part of the legal framework around what can and can't be built or developed in Boxted. ave you heard of Ardleigh **L** PACE or Manningtree PACE (Practical Actions for Climate and Emergency)- Registered Charitable Incorporated Organisation -1204980 *https://www.pacemanningtree.org.uk/?* In both village organisations, groups of pushing forward schemes to help residents take positive action, work together to facilitate and promote various projects. There is the Manningtree Community Energy Scheme which after a survey of roof top space recognised there is a high potential for solar photovoltaic panels (pv) and battery storage across Manningtree, Mistley and Lawford. Interested people are able to purchase solar panels and batteries outright (via a discounted supplier) or choose a funded option (panels installed at no

cost to homeowner and paid for on a 'pay as you save' basis). If no suitable roof space, the residents can buy energy from the community solar scheme (likely to be cheaper). If people already have panels but interested in taking part - they can put the surplus generated into the scheme or buy and add a smart battery. There is a minimum number of expressions of interest needed to make the scheme viable. The scheme is now extended to include Ardleigh. Residents have free surveys and quotes on expressing interest with no commitment on homeowner's part. Other projects include extending the Tendring Primary Recycle Scheme to include two drop off points in Ardleigh. This really adds to what can be recycled to include crisp packets, bread wrappers, tetra cartons, toothbrushes and bathroom toiletry plastics, coffee machine pods, spectacles, bottle tops, drink can pulls some of which are passed on to fundraising schemes; a tree planting scheme free trees for households and also community places; Manningtree PACE also work to promote food growth via PACE allotments; Manningtree Earth Festival; they have a programme of outreach to engage with as many local residents as possible; River Stour water quality sampling in the River Stour - 9 trained personnel who report results to Environment Agency; Wild gardens of Lawford; Cargo bike - £1 an hr or £6 a day cargo bike hire (large carrying capacity

with trailer and carrying box attached) – 2 bikes available; Plastic free Mistley & Manningtree project – working with retailers, businesses and clubs to eliminate plastics; Street Keepers – local group weeding and cleaning the communal areas of streets. It is all very positive stuff and Boxted councillors would like to see if there is scope to organise along similar lines in Boxted. Again, if you are interested in knowing more, then email the clerk and we can kick off with a meeting in the Spring.

S orry to finish on a negative note but we have suffered several days of anti-social behaviour on the field with significant rubbish strewn about and glass bottles smashed. A small army of early walkers have been great at clearing up and it is appreciated. If you know any of the perpetrators, could you let them know that the police will be calling in and they should stop creating such a dangerous mess.

Probus Club of Colchester — September Meeting

ur club met for its annual Presidents Lunch. This year we went back to the Colne Valley Golf Club, where, after ordering drinks, Golf club staff offered a nice selection of canapes. This was followed by a superb lunch.



Afterwards a very interesting talk was delivered by David Prior from the **Sutton Hoo Ships Company.** He commenced with the background of the discovery and excavation just before the start of WW2. The site was covered over during the war and then later the site was excavated again to reveal and Anglo Saxon ship some 14 feet wide and 90 foot long.

A decision was made to construct a replica of the original ship. This commenced with visits to Denmark and Sweden, where replicas of Viking ships were being recreated.

For authenticity the UK team have had made copies of the original hand tools used at the time. The construction is being built from green oak and most of the oak trees were donated except for the one used for the keel. This had to be bought in and cut with modern machinery. The oak trees used in the construction are split using wedges, so that the split along the length of the truck of the tree is following the natural grain.

A most interesting talk and those attending were advised that they could visit the building where the replica is being constructed and entry is without charge.

Our next meeting is at the Colchester Rugby clubs premises. Members meet up for coffee at 1000 for a 1030 start. The talk this time is titled The Jumbo Tower – Past, Present, and Future.

LANGHAM LADIES

he speaker for the Langham Ladies meeting on Thursday November 9th, was Paula Short her talk being "Stars and the War" The stars who she spoke about were James Stuart, Marlena Dietrich and Clarke Gable. James Stuart's acting career was paused after he enlisted in the US Army Air Force during World War II deputy commanding the 2nd Bombardment Wing, the 703e Bombardment Squadron. He was a very brave fighter pilot taking an active role in the D Day Landings. He was sent overseas to fly B24Liberator bombers over Nazi occupied Europe. At that time the aircrews were expected to be killed after 8to 12 missions but James Stuart flew 20 missions. He entered the war as a Private but came out a Colonel in the Army Air Corps. He retired in 1968 and died 1997. Marlena Dietrich was among those who volunteered for USO tours in 1944-1945. She travelled to Algeria, France, Italy and Germany to visit the wounded soldiers and sing to the troops, often under difficult and dangerous conditions. After the war she went back to USA to become a Cabaret star. When she died her body was taken back to Berlin to be buried next to her Mother.

Clarke Gable enlisted as a Private in the AAF in 1942 at Los Angeles as a rear gunner. He flew at least 5 missions as a Captain, filming 50,000ft of gunnery combat during 1943. He was promoted to Colonel and presented with many medals. He was a Hero during the war and also a Hero on the screen. As you can see from the information above this talk was very interesting and showed how very brave some of the screen stars were during the war.

n Friday December 2nd many of the members will enjoy a lunch celebrating Christmas at The Court House in Great Bromley.

HANGING ON TO HOPE!

t the beginning of November, I was privileged to meet with Shang (Peshang), an Iraqi Kurdish 29 year

elderly subjected to torture, human trafficking, isolation and starvation. It took Shang nearly a year to reach the UK from Iraq, facing all of the

old man who has been through the most difficult, life threatening challenges we, as British citizens, can only imagine in nightmares.

I first met Shang at the BBQ at Langham Community Centre in July which was referred to in the September issue. Shang worked as a YouTube, social media influencer in Iraq before he was forced to leave his home, family and



friends following a brutal attack by Government agents (PDK-PUK) in 2021 in his small rural home neighbourhood. He was no longer safe to stay there.

Listening to Shang's story, it became clear to me just how real all the awful experiences we read about and see in the news are. Innocent babies, children, men, women and the above and fearing death at every moment. Whilst listening to Shang's story it is clear he is a remarkable, passionate and dedicated individual, standing up against the corruption and brutal oppression of his home country. But there are deep wounds and what Shang experienced would do nothing short of leaving any human being with post traumatic stress and complex mental health problems.

hang expressed his happiness when he arrived in the UK, visiting London and a taxi driver asking 'Where to luv?'. The warmth and friendliness in this question, immediately made Shang realise he no longer needed to fear for his life. Colchester has been Shang's home since September 2022, living in the Holiday Inn on Birchwood road



with other asylum seekers. It's taken a while for Shang to trust in people but meeting Martin Green from Community 360 has helped rebuild his trust in others. Martin is the community driver for the asylum seekers and has been supporting Shang and many others to get on their feet and become independent. Shang has also kept as busy as he can (in his words to keep his mind off thinking about what happened to him). Volunteering in the Langham Village shop once a week as well as recording videos for Colchester City Council and filming clips for Table Tennis England.

Very sadly the Holiday Inn is no longer going to accommodate asylum seekers

after mid-December. This means all residents will be relocated. Some to the Bibby Stockholm Barge in Dorset. Again, setting fear for many as to where they will end up eventually and if they will be sent back home. Nothing is certain until they receive Refugee visa status.

At the end of meeting Shang, it was hard not to shed a tear. Sadness at what he has had to experience and for so many who have suffered or lost lives as a result of fleeing their country.






