Mid-July saw a coffee **& chat morning** at the Hub with thanks to Doug and team.


August saw the annual members outing, this year a social day out tasting the delights of

Aldercar Wood is a locally run club for any of us wanting to get a good deal for heating oil.

Frequently Asked Questions

- **Is this a commercial operation?** No, it is coordinated by a Boxted volunteer resident
- Do I have to pay to join? No, once the prices are secured, you pay the oil company for your order there is no agent transaction involved.
- What discount do I get? Making a bulk order means the oil company offers a better rate to us all everyone benefits.
- □ Isn't Boiler Juice cheaper? The price of oil changes every day, but for the last year, Boiler Juice's rate was beaten by the club price (remember Boiler Juice also charge a £10 fee on top of the per litre rate).
- How does it work? A reminder email is sent out and a purchase date is set. You can advise what quantity you would like the same minimum order of 500 litres is required. You can name a price you don't want to exceed if you wish (based on current market rate) The total club volume is put out to oil suppliers and the lowest price is selected. You then make your order direct with the company and benefit from the communal saving. If the price doesn't match your target price, then you don't have to place an order. There is nothing to lose.
- **How do I get included** Once you choose to participate, your email will be stored securely and you'll get an email reminder until such time as you unsubscribe.
- Does my personal data get used by others? No, the club only uses your address to send the reminder email out and is held securely until such time as you unsubscribe.

BOXTED HISTORY GROUP

n the 16th century Essex was a hotbed of witchcraft, with the first witch trial being held in1553. In 1582 Ursula Kemp, an inhabitant of St Osyth, was accused of being a witch. In those days St Osyth was a small place with a population of about 300 and was not particularly prosperous. Ursula, with her great knowledge of herbs, eked out a living as a healer. She had agreed to help Grace Thurlow who had become lame. Whatever Ursula did worked because Grace's health improved. When Grace's son fell ill Ursula was called in again and once more met with success. However, when Grace's daughter was born Ursula was not invited to attend and this caused some resentment. The child died. When Grace's lameness returned, Ursula offered to cure her for a charge of 12 pence.

After the treatment Grace refused to pay and Ursula, a bad-tempered woman, exploded with anger and vowed that the lameness which she had cured would return. When it did it instigated a charge of witchcraft and Ursula was arrested and sent to be held in Colchester castle. The charge of witchcraft was a spark that caused a fire. Rumours spread, perhaps fuelled by old grievances, and soon 13 women had been accused and arrested. The trial took place in Chelmsford and 3 women of the 13 were found guilty. Ursula spent nearly 10 years in prison before returning to St Osyth.

hen in 1921 a certain Mr. Brooker dug up a skeleton in his garden. The body had obviously been buried outside the church grounds - itself a sign that it belonged to someone who had committed a very serious crime. It was soon established that it belonged to Ursula Kemp. Brooker was an unscrupulous man and soon started charging people 6 pence a time to view the remains. He even had postcards printed so that visitors could take away a souvenir.

In 1963 Brooker and his son tried to sell the land for development but no one was interested and the owner of a museum in Cornwall bought the skeletal remains.

When the museum closed they were bought by an artist who lived in Devon. On his death the bones were examined carefully and dated to the late 16th century. The examination showed the person had lived mainly on fish and eels, such as would typical of a place like St Osyth. Plans were made to return the skeleton there for burial but that proved difficult owing to the lack of paperwork. Eventually permission was granted and the bones were buried with a proper ceremony. Ursula had come home. Since then a plaque has been put up in the front of Colchester castle commemorating all those who were accused of witch craft.

FROM THE OAK OF GERNIKA TO THE OAKS OF LANGHAM

Basque refugee children in Langham 1937-9

Last Friday's Community Café at Langham Community Centre saw Dr Ed Packard of the Basque Children of '37 Association unveil a plaque commemorating the 53 Basque children and their teachers who found refuge at The Oaks during the Spanish Civil War.



Ed Packard was one of several guests who had joined



nearly 50 Langham people at the July Café, hosted by St Mary's & St Peter's Churches. Others included Colin Kerr of the Peace Pledge Union, which had funded and managed the 'colony' at The Oaks,

and Paul Campion of the Colchester Quakers.

The plaque was erected by the Langham Parish Council and cast by Yorkshire-based Croft Cast Signs to the Langham Heritage Group's design. It was funded by public subscription, which included a substantial donation by the Basque Children of '37 Association.

Our Parish Magazine – Past, Present and Future

PAST:

'm not quite sure when the Magazine was first published. I can trace a full set of archives back to early 2008, but I'm sure the history goes back much further than that. Previous editors such as Ian Hollands can probably fill us in on that! Looking back at 2008 editions, the style was very different from today: 4 sheets of loose-leaf A4, totally black and white, and nearly 50% filled with very local advertising. Some of the advertisers are long gone, a few are still well known local names.

PRESENT:

Today's magazine is a far more colourful affair, thanks to advances in affordable colour printing in more recent years. Published in bound A5 format, it's typically 32 pages these days, although it ebbs and flows a bit from month to month according to the number of articles received by the Editor. The mix of content is rather different now, with only about 25% of printing space given over to paid advertisements. There is now far more community information and notices, which is hopefully valued by at least some of the 1200+ households that receive a new magazine each month.

What has changed very little since 2008 is the unsung army of about 30 volunteers who walk and cycle round Langham and Boxted pushing newsletters through letterboxes each month. Pretty much the same people as in 2008! We're all getting older, and sadly a few have passed away as well.

THE FUTURE?

S o how will the magazine evolve further over the next few years? On the one hand, printing technology offers more potential for colourful and interesting content, and we have taken advantage of that over recent years, to produce a more information rich magazine. But on the other hand: the advertising world is becoming increasingly digital, the magazine distribution teams are increasingly creaking at the seams, and we might very soon be reaching the point where a physical magazine is no longer viable. That would surely be a great shame...but it's really a question for the whole village community to consider carefully. If you value the future of a physical local magazine, then now is the time to consider volunteering to

join the distribution team (either as a regular distributor, or maybe as a "locum" to cover holiday absences etc.). And if you run a local business, now is the time consider whether you'd like to place a small regular advert in the magazine, to promote your business locally, whilst also helping support its continued publication costs.
